ROCK HILL — A coin-operated photocopier for public convenience has been installed in the York County headquarters library on Oakland Avenue, according to Norma Lightsey, Director.

Readers can now make their own photocopies of magazine articles, pages of books, or private papers such as wills and letters.

Students needing material from non-circulating reference books, such as encyclopedias and rare volumes in the South Caroliniana collection, will also benefit from the service.

ROCK HILL — The new \$16,000 York County Library Bookmobile will be on public display in Rock Hill tomorrow.

The vehicle will be parked on St. John Court beside the Rock Hill Library and will be open for tour from 10:30 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Containing 115 square feet of library space, the Bookmobile houses 2,500 to 3,000 volumes. It will be on an introductory tour of the county during November.

York County Library receives three grants

ROCK HILL — Three grants totaling \$10,601 have been made to the York County Library by the State Library Board in order to improve the library's service to York County citizens.

Norma L. Lightsey, director of the library, announced receipt of the grants today.

The first, for \$7,876, was made under the state's "Book Collection Improvement Project." The money will be spent on purchases of standard books of permanent value, the library director said.

A second grant, for \$2,500, goes to new library systems and is designed to help them catch up with older libraries. This money will be used to rebind books of permanent value and to purchase library equipment.

A third grant, for \$225, will enable the library to renew subscriptions to periodicals, mostly in business and technical fields.

Bookmobile plans community visits

ROCK HILL — There still is time to get your community listed for stops by the new bookmobile of the York County Library.
