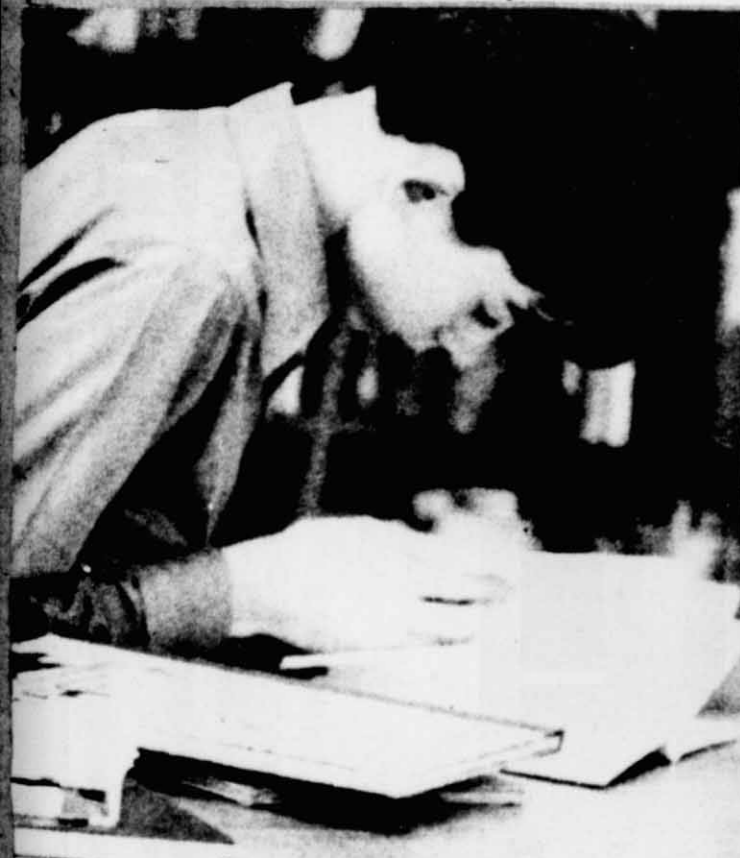

## Awarded scholarship

ROCK HILL — Mrs. Nelma H. Hood of the York County Library was awarded a scholarship by the South Carolina State Library, for study at Columbia College.

She attended a three-week course on Children's Literature which concluded recently.

The grant is one of the 12 summer study scholarship awarded to public library staff members in ten different counties. The courses financed in this way may enable staff members without a formal library science education to qualify for certification by the State Library.
